MAJOR DAVID J. ARMITAGE

Major Armitage is the Air Officer Commanding, Cadet Squadron 13, Cadet Group 2, Commandant of Cadets at the United States Air Force Academy, Colorado. He commands over 120 Air Force cadets and two non-commissioned officers in support of the Academy's mission to educate, train, and inspire lieutenants and future leaders of character for the Air Force and our nation. He was commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of Texas, Austin and completed Undergraduate Navigator Training at Naval Air Station Pensacola, Florida. He is a Weapon Systems Operator in the F-15E Strike Eagle. Major Armitage has served as a flight commander, flight instructor, flight evaluator, and assistant director of operations. He has flown over 1500 hours, 350 of which are combat hours in support of Operations Noble Eagle, Southern Watch, and Iraqi Freedom. Major Armitage flew combat air patrol (CAP) over

Washington, D.C. after the attack on the Pentagon on 9-11.



MASTER SERGEANT BRIAN M. BOISVERT

Master Sgt. Brian M. Boisvert, is the superintendent of Public Affairs for the 97th Air Mobility Wing, Altus Air Force Base, Oklahoma. As the superintendent, he is responsible for seven military members and four civilians who provide community outreach, advice to the base commander and internal/external communication via the base websites and other media or journalistic outlets. He has been published in such periodicals as Time, Intercom Magazine, Grizzley Calif. National Guard and Citizen Airman to other numerous local and base newspapers including the N.Y. Times, The Washington Post, Stars and Stripes, and congressional briefings. He has also been trained and deployed as a videographer, graphic artist, and editor for the deployed base newspaper The Blaze. His works have also been featured at the Corcoran Gallery of Art. On September 11, 2001, he was assigned to the 11th Communications Squadron at Bolling AFB,

and was the first Air Force photographer on scene after the Pentagon attack during 9-11.



CHAPLAIN COLONEL JIMMY M. BROWNING

Chaplain, Colonel Jimmy M. Browning is the Deputy Command Chaplain, Headquarters Air Combat Command, Joint Base Langley-Eustis, VA. As the Deputy Command Chaplain, he is responsible to the Command Chaplain for implementing policies, providing guidance, pastoral care and support to the members of the Air Combat Command Chaplain Corps. He advises commanders on matters of religion, ethical concern and quality of life issues and coordinates ACC Chaplain Corps personnel issues with HAF and DPAH. Additionally, he provides guidance and support regarding officer and enlisted assignments and oversees all staffing actions to include suspense management, plans and programs, education and training, inspections, manpower and deployment requirements. Finally, he represents the ACC Command Chaplain in his absence. After the 9-11 attack, Chaplain Browning was

instrumental in the stand-up of a support team that provided guidance and pastoral care to mortuary affairs and responders at the Pentagon.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL TIMOTY J. CONKLIN

Lieutenant Colonel Timothy J. Conklin is the Commander of the 120th Fighter Squadron, Colorado Air National Guard, Buckley Air Force Base, Colorado. Lt Col Conklin was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force after graduation from the United States Air Force Academy in 1988. He served for ten years on active duty as an operational F-16 pilot. He joined the Colorado Air National Guard in 1998 as a flying training instructor and served as the Chief of Standardization and Evaluation, Chief of Scheduling, Flight Commander, Director of Operations, Wing Chief of Safety and the 140th OSS Commander. He has 149 F-16 combat missions flying in Operations DESERT STORM, PROVIDE COMFORT II, NORTHERN WATCH, SOUTHERN WATCH and three tours in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM. After 9-11, Lt Colonel Conklin was the first airborne pilot from Buckley with an armed aircraft.



CHAPLAIN COLONEL WALTER COURTER (RETIRED)

Chaplain Courter is currently the Senior Pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church in San Antonio, Texas. Chaplain Courter entered the United States Air Force Chaplain Service in October 1977 by direct commission, and was first assigned to the 100th Combat Support Group (SAC), Beale Air Force Base, California as a Chaplain. In 1980 he was selected for a tour at the USAF Academy in Colorado until 1983. In June 2001, he assumed his strategic leadership position at USAF Headquarters, Office of the Chief of Chaplains at the Pentagon. Chaplain Courter, stationed at the Pentagon on 11 September 2001, was the Senior Lead Chaplain at the Department of Defense Family Assistance Center in downtown Arlington, VA during the Pentagon Rescue and Recovery crisis action efforts. At the end of June 2003, Chaplain Courter moved into another senior military leadership position as the Chief, Chaplain Personnel Office of the Air

Force Personnel Center located at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas. In that capacity, he was the director of all "Human Resources" for the Air Force Chaplain Service. He retired in October 2007 with over thirty years of active duty service to the nation.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL FRANCIS T. DOIRON (RETIRED)

Lieutenant Colonel Francis T. Doiron (Retired) is currently an Operations Program Analyst for the Space-Based Infrared System (SBIRS) supporting Headquarters Air Force Space Command (HQ AFSPC) at Peterson Air Force Base Colorado. Lt Col Doiron recently retired as the Chief of the Missile Warning/Missile Defense Operations Branch, HQ AFSPC. In that capacity he led 20 personnel responsible for over \$100 billion in the nation's missile warning, missile defense & surveillance programs. He guided development of operational concepts and strategic plans for national & international missile warning capabilities. He advocated for funding and manpower and provided resources for operations and sustainment of a \$10 billion space-based missile warning system. Finally, Lt Col Doiron ensured requirements for missile warning and missile defense systems' performance and training are met prior to Air Force operational acceptance.

As a Space and Missiles officer, Lt Col Doiron has performed duties in the following operational areas: missile warning, satellite command and control, launch, nuclear command and control, and missile combat crew. He has served as a staff officer at Air Force Space Command, Multi-National Forces-Iraq, and US Strategic Command. During 9-11, Lt Col Doiron was assigned as the flight commander for 564th Missile Squadron whose flight was put on alert during the days following the attacks.





BATTALION CHIEF STEVEN P. FITZGERALD

Chief Fitzgerald is currently the Battalion Chief with the New York Fire Department where his duties include serving as the executive officer to the Manhattan Borough Commander. In addition, he is also responsible for over-seeing the reconstruction process of the World Trade Center. From October 1998 through February 2003, he was a supervisor assigned to Engine Company 54 located in the Times Square section of Manhattan. His unit responded to the World Trade Center attacks on the afternoon of September 11, 2001, which resulted in the loss of 17 members of the company. Chief Fitzgerald is also a Senior Airman assigned to the 105th Airlift Wing, N.Y. Air National Guard as a firefighter.



MASTER SERGEANT MICHAEL J. GARCIA (RETIRED)

Master Sgt. Garcia enlisted in the Air Force in 1980 as a Security Forces Airman and retired in 2003. Mr. Garcia currently works for the Department of Homeland Security and has over 28 years of experience as a security specialist, particularly in the areas of physical security, surveillance, threat analysis, executive protection and vulnerability assessment. He has experience in leading and managing protective security teams in a dynamic, operational, and high threat environment. On September 11, 2001, MSgt Garcia was assigned to the Pentagon's Defense Protective Services now known as the Pentagon Force Protection Agency. MSgt Garcia is an excellent photographer whose crime scene photographs of the Pentagon, September 11, 2001 are currently on display at the Smithsonian and are soon to be on display at the NYC 9-11 Museum at ground zero. He has conducted assessments in support of National Security Special

Events (NSSE) for the Democratic/Republican conventions, State of the Union, Presidential Inaugurations and the Super Bowl.



MASTER SERGEANT JOHN J. GORMAN (RETIRED))

Master Sergeant Gorman retired from the New York Air National Guard 2006. From 1980 through January 2010 he was assigned to the Port Authority police of New York and New Jersey. As Port Authority, his area of responsibility included the Newark Airport, PA bus terminal (Times Square), World Trade Center, Staten Island Bridges, and Port Authority Trans-Hudson (PATH). On September 11, 2001, he responded to the attack on the World Trade Center at approximately 1400 hours. He assisted in the search of concourse level/PATH and subway entrances and debris field predominately on the Liberty Street side of the complex from Church Street to West Street which consisted of the South Tower and the Marriott Hotel. He continued working on the site until the end of October 2001.



HMCS (SEAL) ROBERT J. GUZZO (RETIRED)

Senior Chief (SEAL) Guzzo enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1976. He volunteered for BUD/S, Basic Underwater Demolition SEAL training, and reported to Coronado, CA in January 1979. Upon graduation he was assigned to Underwater Demolition Team 11, now designated SEAL Team Five. With ten years of special operations experience combined with joint service Antiterrorism (AT) and force protection (FP) training provided the expertise to conduct world-wide AT/FP vulnerability assessments. He was peer selected to the Naval Security Coordination Team, more commonly known as RED CELL, whose mission is to test the security of U.S. bases and other installations. Senior Chief Guzzo was interviewed and selected to The Defense Threat Reduction Agency as a Terrorist Options Analyst to the agency's Joint Staff Integrated Vulnerability Assessment Team (JSIVA). His unique combination of special forces knowledge and global

antiterrorism training led to a by name selection to assist with the stand-up of the Pentagon's Defense Protective Services now (Pentagon Force Protection Agency) antiterrorism cell in late August of 2001. Senior Chief (SEAL) Robert Guzzo was decorated with The Navy and Marine Corps Medal for heroic actions on September 11, 2001. Senior Chief Guzzo retired in August 2002.



MAJOR GENERAL JAMES T. JACKSON (RETIRED)

Major General (Retired) Jackson is a senior-level executive with a successful military career that included ever increasing responsibility in diverse and complex organizations ranging in size from 30 to 17,000 staff. His significant achievements include leading and managing large, multidisciplinary professional teams, resulting in the development of high performing organizations. General Jackson has extensive hands-on experience in program development, personnel management, operations direction, security operations, establishing and meeting strategic and operational goals, and resource allocation. His operational experience includes strategic planning, team building, financial management, communications, risk management, and security operations. From 2000-2001, he was assigned as the Chief Executive Officer, Commanding General, U.S. Army Military District of Washington, Washington, D.C., where

he supervised and managed all aspects of a more than 7000-person organization comprised of seven geographically separated installations across four states. He managed all military aspects of the recovery operations at the Pentagon following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. He developed plans and executed all security operations and coordinated plans and contingency operations with more than 40 federal, state, and local jurisdictions.



MR. CHARLIE KERRIGAN

Mr. Kerrigan is currently the Commander of Hernando County Fire Corps, a group of volunteers who assist emergency units in Hernando County and is also the Florida State Advocate for Fire Corps. Mr. Kerrigan has a Master's degree in Health Education from Adelphi University in Garden City, New York and a Professional Diploma for School District Administrator from Long Island University, Brooksville, New York. Mr. Kerrigan taught physical education, health education and then moved into administration in Rockville Center, NY until he retired in August of 2007. A long time member of Rockville Centre Fire Department, he served on the Department Board of Instructions, as an Advanced First Aid Instructor, EMTCC, and an officer for six years as 2d Lieutenant, 1st Lieutenant and Captain from the years of 1991 through 1997. In 2001, he was a volunteer firefighter for Rockville Centre Fire Department and was deployed to assist recovery

efforts during 9/11. Mr. Kerrigan spent 18 hours at Ground Zero assisting with the recovery and rescue efforts.





LIEUTENANT COLONEL CHERYL L. LOWRY

Lieutenant Colonel Cheryl Lowry is the Chief of Physical Standards, Air Force Medical Support Agency, Rosslyn, Virginia. Lt Col Lowry is also consultant to the Air Force Surgeon General for operational medicine and human performance enhancement, and works with Army and Navy counterparts to draft interoperability doctrine and policy. Lt Col Lowry entered the US Air Force in 1985 as a Law Enforcement Specialist. She earned her commission in 1993 and received a Doctorate of Medicine from the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in 1997. She completed family practice training as Chief Resident, Malcolm Grow Medical Center, Andrews AFB, Maryland. She has also completed residencies in aerospace and preventive medicine, and maintains board certifications in aerospace, occupational, and family medicine. Lt Col Lowry created a Flight Medicine Clinic at Bolling Air Force Base, and led elements of response and recovery operations following the attack on the Pentagon in 2001. She also deployed in support of Operations NOBLE EAGLE, IRAQ FREEDOM, AND ENDURING FREEDOM.



TECHNICAL SERGEANT GREGG J. MAGI

Technical Sergeant Gregg J. Magi is currently a Captain in the New York Fire Department and is assigned to Division 7 in the Bronx. Prior to this assignment, he was a firefighter assigned to Division 3, Squad 18, and Engine 82. Mr. Magi assisted in the search and recovery efforts at the World Trade Center following the attacks on the towers on 9-11. Mr. Magi gained his expansive experience while working as a volunteer firefighter for ten years with the Stony Point NY Fire Department. In 2001, he joined the 105th Air National Guard and is a Technical Sergeant assigned to the Fire Protection Unit. As a guardsman, Technical Sergeant Magi has deployed three times in support of Operation IRAQ FREEDOM. He currently lives in Stony Point, NY.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL WILLIAM "DAVID" MATHEWS

Lieutenant Colonel David Mathews is the Operations Officer for the 8th Space Warning Squadron, Buckley Air Force, Colorado. He is second in command of a 59-person reserve associate unit charged with operating the Space Base Infrared System (SBIRS) program, including operations training, crew force management, configuration control, weapons and tactics, intelligence, operations plans and future programs. This space-based system provides immediate global and theater missile warning to forces deployed worldwide, North American Aerospace Defense Command, United States Strategic Command, the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the governments of the United States and Canada. During his career, he has held a variety of positions in intelligence, and operational space and missile units including serving as Joint Space Officer to the Joint Advance Warfighting Program at the Institute for Defense Analyses, and 14th

Air Force Exchange Officer to U.S. Army, Space and Missile Defense Command - Army Strategic Command. Other former assignments include 742nd Missile Squadron at Minot AFB, North Dakota, 1st Command and Control Squadron, Cheyenne Mountain AS, Colorado, 29th Intelligence Squadron and Fort Meade, Maryland. During the attacks of 9-11, he was assigned to the White House and was working in the White House Situation Room.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL MICHAEL C. MCMAHON

Lt Col McMahon is the Deputy Head of the Department of Economics and Geosciences and an Assistant Professor of Geosciences at the United States Air Force Academy and teaches regional-cultural, environmental, and military geography courses. He is the Course Director for the military, environmental, Asia geography courses and an instructor in the Middle East-Africa, Latin America, and national security geography courses. A career US Air Force Intelligence Officer, Lt Col McMahon is fully qualified as a collections and analytical officer. Following multiple intelligence training programs and Japanese language training in Texas, Arizona, California, and Virginia, Lt Col McMahon was assigned to Yokota Air Base, Japan as a Human Intelligence officer. He was then selected for the competitive USAF Foreign Area Specialist Program and studied for two years as a Dean's Fellow at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA) in New York City. Upon graduation with a Masters Degree in International Affairs (International Security Policy, Latin American Studies, and Spanish), he was selected to join the USAF Special Operations School (USAFSOS) faculty at Hurlburt Field, FL, and served as Director of both the Latin American Orientation and the Asia-Pacific Orientation Courses. He also served as the USAFSOS Chief of Non-resident Education and instituted the use of video-tele instruction and distributed formal courses to numerous Joint Special Operations bases worldwide. Lt Colonel McMahon was stationed in NYC during the attack of the World Trade Center and volunteered in the rescue efforts at Ground Zero.



COLONEL JOSEPH A. MILNER

Colonel Joseph A. "Joe" Milner is the Commander, 42d Mission Support Group, Maxwell AFB, Alabama. He is responsible for providing community support for 12,500 military and civilian employees associated with Air University, the 42d Air Base Wing, the 908th Airlift Wing and 40+ tenant units at Maxwell AFB and Gunter Annex. His 2,250-person group provides contracting, security, fire protection, air traffic control and systems maintenance, personnel and information management, environmental restoration, logistics readiness and transportation management, grounds maintenance and services for 45,000 military members, civilian employees, retirees and family members. Prior to this assignment, Colonel Milner was a National Defense Fellow at the Institute for Defense Analyses, Washington D.C. During September 11, 2001, he was stationed at the Pentagon as an executive officer, Security Forces Directorate. Col Milner was awarded the Aiman's Medal for his selfless acts during the Sept 11 attacks on the Pentagon.



FIRE CHIEF EDWARD (ED) PLAUGHER (RETIRED)

Chief Ed Plaugher is currently the Assistant Executive Director of National Programs and Consulting Services for the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) located in Fairfax, Virginia. Chief Plaugher is a member of the Emergency Response Senior Advisory Committee (ERSAC) of the Homeland Security Council (HSC), Department of Homeland Security, and recently served as a special advisor to the Defense Science Board for the Department of Defense. He was appointed to the position of Fire Chief of the Arlington County (Virginia) Fire Department and served in that capacity until his retirement in June 2004. Chief Plaugher directed the regional terrorism preparedness efforts for the National Capital Region as Chair of the Council of Governments (MWCOG), Fire Chiefs Terrorism Committee, and was the Executive Agent for the nation's first Metropolitan Medical Strike Team. On September 11th, 2001, Chief Plaugher led Arlington County's response efforts to the terrorist attack at the Pentagon, coordinating and leading the local, regional, state and federal response to the incident. For his preparedness and response efforts, Chief Plaugher was awarded the Secretary of the Army "Public Service Award" and the Secretary of Defense "Exceptional Public Service" in June of 2004. In August of 2004, Fire Chiefs Magazine named Chief Plaugher as "Career Fire Chief of the Year." Chief Plaugher's career spans more than 40 years as a fire service professional.





DAVID W. RUSSELL III

David W. Russell, III, is a fourth generation Firefighter. His father is a retired Chief, his Grandfather was a retired Firefighter and his Great-Grandfather was a steam Engineer and Department Blacksmith. Russell was assigned to Engine 277/Ladder 112 in Bushwick Brooklyn, New York. In 1994 Russell was promoted to Lieutenant and assigned to Engine 62, which covers the North Bronx. During September 11, 2001, Lieutenant Russell was at home off duty when his wife called him from work to tell him he was going to work because a plane had crashed into one of the WTC Towers and the building was on fire. After a quick look at the news, Lieutenant Russell realized the plane was not a Cessna as it was being reported and responded to the quarters of Engine 62/Ladder 32. Lieutenant Russell and his team commandeered a city bus and made their way to lower Manhattan, just arriving after the collapse of the second tower. Lieutenant Russell did not return home until Saturday, September 15, 2001. Lieutenant Russell continued working at the site until March 30, 2002. On November 23, 2005, Lieutenant Russell retired from the New York Air National Guard as a Technical Sergeant with 30 years of service and on November 23, 2008, he retired from the Fire Department of New York with 23 years of service.



COLONEL JAMES E. THOMPSON (RETIRED)

James Edward Thompson is a 1968 graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy. After flying B-52 missions in South East Asia, James returned to the States and continued his education at the University of Florida College of Law. After graduation he clerked for the Honorable Paul Hitch Roney of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit. Mr. Thompson is a past partner in the Law firms of Kutak, Rock, LLP and Saunders, Snyder Ross and Dickerson. Before being requested to re-enter active duty, James was an Associate Professor of Law at the University of Tennessee College Of Law. In that capacity, he was part of the Harvard Study Team that traveled to Iraq, in 1990, and published a report entitled: The Effect of The Gulf Crisis On the Children of Iraq, which is published in the New England Journal of Medicine. James is presently a full-time student and part time attorney in his own firm of Thompson and Associates. He is presently serving on the Board

of The Cumberland County Hospice, The Cumberland County Playhouse, and Earth Rights International. He resumed his formal education the summer of 2010 and is finishing a three year Master of Law in Estate Planning and Elder Law in one year. Col Thompson was assigned as the Deputy Chief Counsel for the National Guard Bureau at the Pentagon during the attack on 9-11. Col Thompson's office in the Pentagon was under renovation on 9-11, however, that office was at the approximate location where the plane crashed.

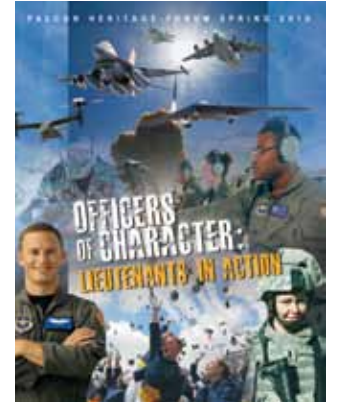
