

MAKING THE MOST OF NCLS

Developing Leaders of Character for the 21st Century at the U.S. Air Force Academy

The mission of the Academy is to educate, train, and inspire men and women to become officers of character motivated to lead Airmen in service to our nation. The Leader of Character Framework is the means (development) by which the Academy accomplishes our mission. Our framework defines what it means to be a leader of character (by practicing our Core Values of Integrity First, Service Before Self, and Excellence In All We Do), and how to go about doing development in this context.



A leader of character is someone who practices our Core Values by:

- 1. Living Honorably (integrity first)...our values and associated virtues, serve as a compass which points toward our "true north" and keeps us on a path expected of those who serve in the profession of arms (rooted in the universal value of care for others).
- 2. Lifting Others (service before self)...to their best possible selves. Each one of us has the capacity to pursue the best of who we are (or want to become), our "best possible selves." Leaders help those around them develop into their best possible selves by caring about them while simultaneously recognizing, supporting, and "lifting" their strengths, passions, and commitments. In short, "lifting others" is about transformational leadership (the work of developing others).
- 3. Elevating Performance (excellence in all we do)...toward a common and noble purpose. A leader of character goes beyond the minimum standard of expected performance to find ways to transform how things are done in a way that extends beyond one's own narrow self-interest and focuses instead on the common good (at the level of the squadron, Air/Space Force, or world). Always striving to be better, a leader of character continually seeks to find ways to improve the mission (adaptive leadership).

How we develop as a leader of character:

Development is a process experienced by an individual, but never an end state. Our organization seeks to do the work of development, by engaging leaders of character in purposeful experiences that assess, challenge, and support. In doing so, we influence their identity, and arm them with the competencies to better practice habits of thoughts and actions in the context of the leadership work to be accomplished for their current and future roles.

Context agnostic:

At the Academy, we utilize this Framework to accomplish our mission. However, we believe it is transferrable and applicable to any context/mission that serves a common and noble purpose.

Inspire Teamwork." - is rooted in the "Leadership, Teamwork, & Organizational Management" Institutional Outcome and explores the many facets of what it takes to successfully lead diverse teams in today's complex environment. In-Sync: Activation Leadership, Collaboration, and Creativity Through a Musical Lens

ARKAI is an award-winning electroacoustic duo that has inspired audiences around the world through their genredefying string music. Graduates of The Juilliard School, their past engagements have included performances at The MET, Joe's Pub, City Winery, Javits Center, Lincoln Center, Musikfest, Chateau Marmont, and Carnegie Hall. Their electronic debut composition, "Letters from COVID", was featured at TED@PMI for a global audience of over 30,000 people from 182 countries.

As creative collaborators, ARKAI was commissioned by the Museum of Chinese in America to compose a work for their exhibition Responses: Asian Americans Resisting the Tides of Racism. Other commissions have included a piece for Silver Lining Ltd's Impact 5X initiative — a global economic justice project supporting hundreds of small business owners from underserved communities around the world.

ARKAI was selected by the U.S. Department of State and the Association of American Voices to participate in the 2021-22 American Music Abroad season. Through this program, ARKAI has engaged in exchange programs with underserved audiences around the world with little or no access to American music, demonstrating the power of cultural diplomacy as a tool to bring people together.

ARKAI is the winner of the 2021 Astral Artists National Competition.

LT Jason Redman, USN (Retired)

Navy SEAL and Founder, SOF Spoken

Get off the X and Learn to Lead

Drawing on his own combat experiences, Jason will speak on one of the biggest challenges in leadership: how to assess a crisis, develop a plan, and move from it. He will provide tools for quick and effective motivation and communication to bring teams to success and confidence. Appropriate for leaders and managers at all levels, this talk will provide tried and true techniques to make stronger leaders and teams.

Jason Redman is a retired U.S. Navy Lieutenant who spent 11 years as an enlisted Navy SEAL and almost 10 years as a SEAL officer. He was awarded the Bronze Star with Valor, the Purple Heart, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Navy Commendation Medal, the Joint Service Achievement Medal, five Navy Achievement Medals, two Combat Action Ribbons, and the U.S. Army Ranger Tab.

After he was severely wounded in Iraq in 2007, Redman returned to active duty before retiring in 2013.

In 2013 he launched a speaking and consulting company which focuses on inspirational presentations about leadership, teamwork and the "Overcome Mindset," helping individuals, companies and teams to "Get off the X"TM from what he refers to as "life ambushes." In addition, Redman provides workshops, online programs, executive coaching, and business consulting to businesses around the world and group coaching through his Get off the XTM training and Overcome ArmyTM coaching programs.

Redman is the author of the New York Times bestselling memoir "The Trident: The Forging and Reforging of a Navy SEAL Leader" and Amazon bestsellers "Overcome: Crush Adversity with the Leadership Techniques of America's Toughest Warriors" (2019) and "The Pointman Planner", a guided, motivational productivity journal (2021).

Muse Family Foundation Keynote Lecture



Jared Isaacman
CEO, Shift4 Payments
Mission Commander, Polaris Dawn, Inspiration4

A fireside chat with Jared Isaacman: How teamwork is changing the future of human spaceflight and exploration

Join us for a fireside chat with Jared Isaacman where he will share how leadership and teamwork were instrumental in his journey to commanding the world's first all-civilian mission to space and his involvement in the Polaris Program, where he will serve as commander of the Polaris Dawn mission. With expertise in building high-performing teams, Jared will highlight the importance that giving back played in solidifying his teams' culture, commitment and success. He will leave audiences excited for the future of human space exploration and the differences each one of us can make in our own spheres of influence here on Earth.

Isaacman is the CEO of Shift4 Payments, the leader in integrated payment processing solutions. He is an accomplished pilot rated to fly commercial and military aircraft and was the commander of Inspiration4, the world's first all-civilian mission to space.

Isaacman founded Shift4 Payments in 1999 at the age of 16, in the basement of his parent's home. Today, Shift4 handles more than \$200 billion in payments annually for a third of the country's restaurants, hotels, and casinos. Shift4 provides technology solutions for more than 200,000 businesses and has over a dozen offices across the U.S. and Europe. In 2020, Shift4 Payments went public on the New York Stock Exchange and currently trades under the ticker symbol FOUR.

In 2012, Isaacman co-founded Draken International, a provider of tactical aviation services for all branches of the U.S. Military, Department of Defense, and global allied militaries. With a fleet of 150 tactical fighter aircraft, Draken owns and operates the world's largest commercial fleet of ex-military aircraft to support military training objectives around the globe. Isaacman sold the company in 2019 to The Blackstone Group and remained CEO until early 2020.

Inspiration4 took place Sept. 15-18, 2021 marking several important milestones in human spaceflight history. The mission, named Inspiration4 in recognition of the four-person crew's mission to inspire support for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, sent a humanitarian message of possibility. The journey lasted three days, reached an orbital altitude of approximately 585 km (364 mi) and was the highest of any crewed flight in twenty years. Inspiration4 represented a new era for human spaceflight and exploration while raising over \$240,000,000 for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

In February 2022, Isaacman announced an additional three missions planned with SpaceX, called the Polaris Program. He will serve as the mission Commander of the first mission, Polaris Dawn. These three missions will continue to raise funds and awareness for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Isaacman holds several world records, including a Speed-Around-The-World flight to raise money and awareness for the Make-a-Wish Foundation. He has flown in over 100 airshows as part of the Black Diamond Jet Team, dedicating every performance to a charitable cause. As part of Inspiration4's public outreach, Isaacman made a personal \$125 million commitment to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

COLVIN KEYNOTE LECTURE



Dr. Eddie Glaude, Jr.

Author and Political Commentator

Bestselling Author & Chair of Princeton's Department of African American Studies

Race & Democracy: America is Always Changing, But America Never Changes

America's great promise of equality has always rung hollow in the ears of Black Americans. Today, more than 60 years after the civil rights movement, Dr. Eddie Glaude Jr. says the situation is equally dire — and yet, the promise still lives. Drawing from his landmark book, "Democracy in Black: How Race Still Enslaves the American Soul" and his New York Times bestseller "Begin Again: James Baldwin's America and its Urgent Lessons for Our Own", Dr. Glaude presents a picture of race and democracy that is colored by current events and framed by African American history. Bearing witness to the difficult truth in our country today, Dr. Glaude lays bare the tangled web of race, trauma and memory, and what we all must ask of ourselves in order to call forth a new America. He is a member of the American Philosophical Society.

One of the nation's most prominent scholars, Dr. Eddie Glaude, Jr. is an author, political commentator, public intellectual, and passionate educator who examines the complex dynamics of the American experience. His writings, including "Democracy in Black: How Race Still Enslaves the American Soul", "In a Shade of Blue: Pragmatism and the Politics of Black America", and his most recent, the New York Times bestseller, "Begin Again: James Baldwin's America and Its Urgent Lessons for our Own", takes a wide look at Black communities, the difficulties of race in the United States and the challenges we face as a democracy. In his writing and speaking, Glaude is an American critic in the tradition of James Baldwin and Ralph Waldo Emerson, confronting history and bringing our nation's complexities, vulnerabilities and hope into full view. Hope that is, in one of his favorite quotes from W.E.B. Du Bois, "not hopeless, but a bit unhopeful."

Glaude is the James S. McDonnell Distinguished University Professor and Chair of the Department of African American Studies at Princeton. He is also on the Morehouse College Board of Trustees. He frequently appears in the media, as a columnist for TIME Magazine and as an MSNBC contributor on programs like Morning Joe and Deadline: White House with Nicolle Wallace. He regularly appears on Meet the Press on Sundays. Glaude also hosts Princeton's AAS podcast, a conversation around the field of African American Studies and the Black experience in the 21st century.

A highly accomplished and respected scholar of religion, Glaude is a former president of the American Academy of Religion. His books on religion and philosophy include "An Uncommon Faith: A Pragmatic Approach to the Study of African American Religion", African American Religion: A Very Short Introduction, and Exodus! Religion, Race and Nation in Early 19th Century Black America, which was awarded the Modern Language Association's William Sanders Scarborough Book Prize.

Combining a scholar's knowledge of history, a political commentator's take on the latest events, and an activist's passion for social justice, Glaude challenges all of us to examine our collective American conscience, "not to posit the greatness of America, but to establish the ground upon which to imagine the country anew."

ENIX HERITAGE KEYNOTE LECTURE SENIOR LEADER DISCUSSION PANEL



Gen. Charles Q. Brown, Jr.

22nd Chief of Staff of the Air Force

Gen. Brown was commissioned in 1984 as a distinguished graduate of the ROTC program at Texas Tech University. He has served in a variety of positions at the squadron and wing levels, including an assignment to the U.S. Air Force Weapons School as an F-16 Fighting Falcon Instructor. His notable staff tours include Aide-de-Camp to the Chief of Staff of the Air Force; Director, Secretary of the Air Force and Chief of Staff Executive Action Group; and Deputy Commander, U.S. Central Command. He also served as a National Defense Fellow at the Institute for Defense Analyses, Alexandria, Virginia.

Gen. Brown has commanded a fighter squadron, the U.S. Air Force Weapons School, two fighter wings and U.S. Air Forces Central Command. Prior to serving as the Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. Brown was the commander of Pacific Air Forces, Air Component Commander for U.S. Indo-Pacific Command. Gen. Brown is a command pilot with more than 2,900 flying hours, including 130 combat hours.



Gen. B. Chance Saltzman

2nd Chief of Space Operations

Gen. B. Chance Saltzman is the Chief of Space Operations, United States Space Force. As Chief, he serves as the senior uniformed Space Force officer responsible for the organization, training and equipping of all organic and assigned space forces serving in the United States and overseas. As members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Chief of Space Operations and other service chiefs function as military advisers to the Secretary of Defense, National Security Council, and the President.

Gen. Saltzman is a graduate of Boston University and was commissioned in 1991. He has operational experience with missile and space systems, as a Minuteman III launch officer, and as a satellite operator for the National Reconnaissance Office. He also served as the first Chief of Combat Plans for the Joint Space Operations Center, and later, as Chief of Combat Operations.

Gen. Saltzman has commanded at the squadron, group, and wing levels including the 614th Space Operations Squadron and 1st Space Control Squadron at Vandenberg Air Force Base, California; the 46oth Operations Group at Buckley AFB, Colorado; and the Aerospace Data Facility-Colorado, Aurora, Colorado. Before serving in his current assignment, Gen. Saltzman was the Deputy Chief of Space Operations for Operations, Cyber, and Nuclear, United States Space Force, the Pentagon, Arlington, Va.

CMSSF Roger A. Towberman

1st Chief Master Sergeant of the Space Force

Chief Master Sergeant Roger A. Towberman serves at the highest enlisted level of leadership, and as such, provides direction for the enlisted force and represents their interests, as appropriate, to the American public and to those in all levels of government. He acts as the personal adviser to the Chief of Space Operations and the Secretary of the Air Force on all issues regarding the welfare, readiness, morale, and proper utilization and development of the U.S. Space Force. Chief Towberman is the first chief master sergeant appointed to the highest noncommissioned officer position.

Chief Towberman entered the Air Force in September 1990 and his career has included various duties as a ground and airborne cryptologic language and intelligence analyst. Throughout his career, he filled myriad leadership roles at the squadron, group, wing, Numbered Air Force, Major Command and Combatant Command level, while stateside, overseas and deployed. His deployments supported Operations Joint Forge, Allied Force, Northern Watch, Southern Watch, Iraqi Freedom, Enduring Freedom, and Unified Protector. As a career enlisted aviator, he logged more than 4,500 flying hours. He entered the United States Space Force on April 3, 2020.



CMSAF Joanne S. Bass

19th Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force

Chief Bass represents the highest enlisted level of leadership, and as such, provides direction for the enlisted force and represents their interests, as appropriate, to the American public and to those in all levels of government. She serves as the personal adviser to the Chief of Staff and the Secretary of the Air Force on all issues regarding the welfare, readiness, morale, and proper utilization and progress of more than 600,000 Total Force Airmen. Chief Bass is the 19th chief master sergeant appointed to the highest noncommissioned officer position.

Leadership and Flexibility: Adapting to Unwanted Changes in an Uncertain World

Mustafa Aryan will share his life story about how he adapted to unwanted changes and dealt with uncertainties. From his childhood to his adult life, Mustafa's account of surviving and thriving in a war-torn Afghanistan is full of lessons in perseverance and determination. Mustafa believes that change is unavoidable and that adapting to change requires a flexible leadership approach. His talk will highlight events that shaped him into developing integrity, resilience, adaptability, and a positive mindset, among other important leadership facets.

Mustafa Aryan has over 12 years of combined public and private sector experience in Afghanistan. Prior to the US withdrawal from Afghanistan and the fall of the Afghan government, he served at Afghanistan's High Council for National Reconciliation (HCNR) as the Director of Regional and International Affairs. The HCNR was leading the peace talks with the Taliban on behalf of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan. After the Taliban takeover of Afghanistan in August 2021, he left the country and is currently residing in Toronto, Canada. At present, Mustafa works at the University of Toronto. He is also the Director of the Security, Gender, and Development Institute, which operates as an international volunteer network of experts producing research and events focused on a gendered analysis of international security topics. Mustafa is a Salzburg Global Seminar Fellow and a Board Member of the Canadian International Council—Toronto Branch. Mustafa often writes op-eds in English and Persian, several of which have been published in well-known international media outlets. Mustafa holds a master's degree in International Security from the University of Reading in the UK. His areas of interest include diplomacy, foreign policy, intelligence, and international security.

NASA Astronaut and USAF Colonel Raja Chari will discuss his life leading up to his career as a NASA Astronaut, team and leadership training to prepare for his space mission, mission execution in space, leadership lessons and best practices.

Colonel Chari was selected by NASA to join the 2017 Astronaut Candidate Class. He reported for duty in August 2017. The lowa native graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1999 with a bachelor's degrees in Astronautical Engineering and Engineering Science. He continued on to earn a master's degree in Aeronautics and Astronautics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School. He served as commander of the NASA SpaceX Crew-3 mission to the ISS, which launched on November 10, 2021. He served on the International Space Station as part of Expedition 66 and 67 before returning to Earth May 6, 2022, completing the agency's third long-duration commercial crew mission. The international crew of four spent 177 days in orbit.

Beyond the United States, Defense, Space & Security has prominent operations in Australia, India, Saudi Arabia, and the United Kingdom. Colbert is a member of Boeing's Executive Council.

Previously, Colbert was president and chief executive officer of Global Services with responsibility for leading Boeing's aerospace services development and delivery model for commercial, government and aviation industry customers worldwide, focused on global supply chain and parts distribution, aircraft modifications and maintenance, digital solutions, aftermarket engineering, analytics and training.

Prior to that role, Colbert was chief information officer and senior vice president of Information Technology & Data Analytics. In this role, he led all aspects of information technology, information security, data and analytics. He also supported the growth of Boeing's business through IT and analytics-related revenue-generating programs.

Before his role as CIO, he led the Information Technology Infrastructure organization and was responsible for developing and maintaining network, computing, server, storage, collaboration and infrastructure solutions across the enterprise. Before that, he led the IT Business Systems organization, where he managed the computing application systems that support Boeing Finance, Human Resources, Corporate and Commercial Capital business units as well as the company's internal systems. Before joining Boeing in 2009, Colbert was senior vice president of Enterprise Architecture at Citigroup. Before that, he spent 11 years in Ford Motor Company's Information Technology organization, where he held roles of increasing responsibility in the areas of program management, infrastructure engineering and operations, application development, portfolio management and process reengineering.

Colbert is a member of the Executive Leadership Council (ELC) and serves on the board of directors of the Thurgood Marshall College Fund, the Virginia Tech Innovation Campus Advisory Board, and New Leaders, where he serves as board chair. Additionally, he completed two terms on the Georgia Tech President's Advisory Board. Colbert is also a non-executive board member of Archer Daniels Midland (ADM). In 2022, The Black Engineer of the Year Awards (BEYA) named Colbert Black Engineer of the Year, the organization's top honor. Colbert's additional notable accomplishments include receiving the 2021 Capital CIO of the Year ORBIE award for leadership; recognition as one of the Most Influential Black Executives in Corporate America by Savoy magazine in 2020 and 2021; becoming the first recipient of the Fisher Center prize for Excellence in Driving Transformation from the Fisher Center For Business Analytics at Berkeley; winning the 2018 Forbes CIO Innovation Award; recognition as one of the Most Powerful Executives in Corporate America by Black Enterprise magazine in 2017; 2017 Morehouse College Bennie Leadership Award for Excellence in Business; recognition as the 2016 National Society of Black Engineers Golden Torch Legacy Award winner; recognition as the HMG Strategy 2016 CIO of the Year; and, being named a 2015 Ebony Power 100 honoree. She was commissioned in the U.S. Army in 2006 as an intelligence officer and has since served in Operations Iraqi Freedom, Inherent Resolve, Enduring Freedom, and Warp Speed. She is currently stationed at Ft. Gordon, Ga. where she works as an information operations planner for the U.S. Army Cyber Command. Hipp holds a Master of Arts in Strategic Intelligence, a Master of Military Art and Science, and a Bachelor of Arts in Communications. What does it take to become one of the world's top ultra-athletes running distances from 100 miles to 250+ miles nonstop? Dion Leonard's lifestyle was killing him. Weighing 250 pounds; Leonard's uncontrollable eating habits, heavy smoking, and excessive drinking to hide the demons from his abusive and turbulent childhood were leading him to an early grave. Leonard's iron will and innate ability to survive led him to become one of the world's top ultra-runners competing in some of the toughest and most extreme ultra challenges across the planet's most inhospitable locations. One act of kindness would change his life forever during an endurance race in the Chinese Gobi Desert when a stray dog ran with him, forming an unbreakable bond that would become the ultimate challenge of overcoming adversity to achieve the unachievable. His heartwarming and inspiring story will have you wanting more from life. Listen to his incredible life transformation, the 'Don't Look Back' attitude and mindset to become the best you can be and how you too can achieve the unachievable.

As Maxwell's installation commander, she partners with local officials across a three-county, 12-city region with an annual military economic impact of \$1.2 billion.

Colonel Mentzer commissioned in 1997 graduating with academic distinction from the University of Nebraska. She has served as an Air Force Intern for the Deputy Secretary of Defense, a Major Command Legislative Liaison, a Squadron Commander in Southwest Asia, a Joint Staff Planner, an Executive Officer to the Joint Staff Director, Chief Speechwriter to the Air Force Vice Chief of Staff, Executive Officer to the Air Force Chief of Staff, a Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars National Defense Fellow, and as the Vice Commander of a Navy-led Joint Base. Win True, Speaker

Maintaining your integrity when surrounded by people with none

The Road to the Olympics begins with a dream – a dream fulfilled with dedication, sacrifice, perseverance – and an ability to push beyond what others are willing to do. Mercier made the 1992 US Olympic Cycling Team in Barcelona, after just 15 months of competitive racing. He then began a journey as a professional cyclist that would take him around the world. Ultimately, however, he was faced with a Faustian Bargain; continue to chase his dream, but sacrifice his integrity, or walk away.

Mercier is first and foremost a husband, father, and friend. He works in finance, is a public speaker, writes a cycling column for Carmichael Training Systems, and recently published his book "Win True: How you win matters on and off the bike".

Mercier was valedictorian of his class of 13 from Telluride High School, earned a degree in Economics from U.C. Berkeley, is a Certified Financial Planner™ and is nearly finished with a master's in finance from the Harvard University Extension School. He speaks on grit, ethics, and integrity and is an unofficial part of the Character Development Program at the West Point Military Academy.

He was Telluride, Colorado's 1st Olympian, representing Team USA in 1992 at the Barcelona Games. He competed as a professional cyclist from 1993 to 1997 and finished his career as a member of the infamous U.S. Postal Services Cycling Team.



Dr. Dillon SmallChief of Psychological Health, U.S. Air Force Academy

Durable Mindset: Leading yourself to optimal performance.

How can we lead others expertly, when we cannot lead ourselves? Dr. Dillon Small will overview the core tenets to optimal psychological performance, highlighting a training program for building a strong internal framework and durable mindset that is able to withstand the most hostile of stressors. This talk flips traditional mental health on its head – leading with a focus on performance over pathology.

Dr. Small is currently the Chief of Psychological Health at the U.S. Air Force Academy and oversees the Peak Performance Center. He is a high-performance psychologist and has devoted over 10 years to overcoming ordinary by studying and teaming up with high performers as they work collaboratively to elevate their game in athletics, business, academics, and life. He is deeply passionate about optimizing thoughts, behaviors, and emotions for high performance in life. Dr. Small is an Air Force veteran with a Doctorate of Psychology in Clinical Psychology, Master of Arts in Clinical Psychology, and a Master of Arts in Organizational Communication. Dr. Small is also the CEO of an embedded school-based therapy organization, providing in-school therapy to K-12 in the Colorado Springs metro.

He has logged hundreds of hours coaching, mentoring, and training high performance. He is a published author, national speaker, Distinguished Graduate of Squadron Officer School, Certified Executive Coach, and lover of unleaded coffee.



Col Brittany D. Stewart, USAF

U.S. Defense Attaché Office, Dushanbe, Tajikistan, Senior Defense Official/Defense Attaché

Maintaining Mission Focus, Unit Cohesion, and Resilience during the Russian Invasion of Ukraine

In October 2021, Western intelligence reported Russian intention to invade Ukraine, catapulting it to the forefront of strategic competition. Colonel Stewart was the epicenter of Defense outreach to convince the Zelenskyy administration of the growing threat. Along with a majority of embassy personnel without sufficient clearances, Kyiv remained skeptical until the first bombs fell on February 24. Colonel Stewart will discuss the fluid pre-invasion chaos, challenges in implementing U.S. policy goals while the National Security Council strove to avoid recreating the withdrawal from Afghanistan, and leadership demands of maintaining cohesion of effort in the absence of a common operating picture.

Colonel Brittany Stewart assumed duties of Senior Defense Official/Defense Attaché (SDO/DATT) Dushanbe, Tajikistan, in October 2022. From August 2020, she served as SDO/DATT Kyiv, Ukraine. She led Department of Defense elements in Ukraine during the spring 2021 Russian force build-up and February 24, 2022 invasion until the summer 2022 establishment of a one-star structure to administer security assistance. Col Stewart started her career as an intelligence officer at Aviano Air Base, Italy, during the air war over Kosovo. She is now a foreign area officer with embassy tours in Uzbekistan, Hungary, Ukraine, and Tajikistan. Staff tours include U.S. Air Forces Europe; U.S. European, Africa, and Central Commands; Headquarters Air Force; Defense Intelligence Agency; and Department of Defense Office of Inspector General. She received her commission, along with a Bachelor of Science in history with Russian language minor, from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1995. She holds a Master of Science of Strategic Intelligence from National Intelligence University and is a graduate of Joint Forces Staff College, Air War College, and the George C. Marshall Center for Strategic Studies. She is published in the Foreign Area Officer Association's Journal of International Affairs and U.S. Transportation Command's TRANSLOG: Defense Transportation System Bulletin.



Michael Watson, Ph.D.Author and Co-Founder, Opex Analytics (Coupa)

What Leaders Need to Know about AI and Machine Learning

Leaders in modern organizations need a good understanding of data, algorithms used to make decisions, and artificial intelligence (AI).

You don't need to know all the details, but you need to know enough to ask the right questions, to not get fooled, and to make good decisions.

In this talk, we'll cut through the buzzwords and give leaders a framework for understanding Artificial General Intelligence, Practical AI, machine learning, optimization, and thinking about data. The talk will have plenty of examples and references for further study.

Watson is the co-founder and former CEO of Opex Analytics, an Al firm that grew from 0 to 140 people from 2013 to 2019 when LLamasoft acquired it. Coupa acquired LLamasoft in late 2020. At Coupa, he led the Al Center of Excellence until December 2021.

He is an adjunct professor at Northwestern University. He teaches Master's-level courses in Operations Excellence, Managerial Analytics, and Optimization.

He is the lead author of the books "Supply Chain Network Design" and "Managerial Analytics."

Dr. Justin Stoddard

Center for Character and Leadership Development

Dr. Justin Stoddard serves as Assistant Professor and Chief of Innovation and Prototyping at the Center for Character and Leadership Development. Dr. Stoddard enlisted into the United States Army as a combat medic and then commissioned from the Army ROTC program at the University of Colorado, Boulder with a bachelor's degree majoring in both Philosophy and Russian studies. As an Army officer, Dr. Stoddard served in a variety of assignments including rifle platoon leader in Afghanistan, Headquarters Company Commander, and Senior Intelligence Division Chief. Dr. Stoddard earned a master's degree in 2011 from the University of Texas – El Paso in Leadership Studies and Intelligence and National Security Studies, and a PhD in 2019 from the University of Colorado – Colorado Springs in Higher Education Leadership and Research. Dr. Stoddard began instructing at the Academy in 2015 and completed his doctoral research on the resiliency of U.S. Air Force Academy cadets and the important role of adversity in building character. His experience, expertise, and academic research provides the backdrop for his workshops that explore the role of adversity, the process by which we overcome it, and the framework used to build our resiliency as we grow and learn to thrive.

Understanding Resiliency: Capitalizing on Adversity (in-person and virtual)

The last few years of unprecedented global crises have proven the need to develop the ability to overcome adversity and thrive despite chaos at individual, team, and leadership levels. From local to international contexts, significant challenges arise constantly, and the wisdom needed to thrive in this dynamic environment is critically important. Lt Col Wellman is admitted to practice law before the Supreme Court of Montana, the Court of Federal Claims, the Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces, and the United States Supreme Court.

Kimberly "Kim" Mlinaz serves as the Department of the Air Force's Director of the Negotiation and Dispute Resolution Program. Under the oversight of the Deputy General Counsel for Contractor Responsibility and Conflict Resolution, Ms. Mlinaz is responsible for directing DAF conflict management policy, programs, and education. She provides advice and guidance regarding best practices in conflict management and negotiation principles. Further, Ms. Mlinaz is a member of the DAF Coaching Cadre.

After ten years of leadership experience in manufacturing, Ms. Mlinaz earned a Juris Doctor in 2010, and served as a law clerk for the Michigan Senate Majority Policy Office. Ms. Mlinaz's primary area of legal expertise is labor and employment, with a focus on both effective representation and a proactive approach to problem-solving in the workplace. She served DAF in this capacity at Robins Air Force Base, Air Force Materiel Command, and at the Air Force Legal Operations Agency's Labor Law Field Support Center. Building on her practical experience, Ms. Mlinaz added formal training in systems thinking, leadership, and performance coaching to guide leaders toward maximizing performance through effective conflict management in the workplace.
