

The Dennis P. Rando Cadet Humanitarian Fund

The Rando Fund has been serving USAFA since 1996 and now has two missions, sustained solely by private donations:

- Cadet Honor Guard when a current cadet passes away, six cadets may serve as USAFA's official cadet honor guard
 delegation to attend the funeral service. Enabling these cadets to participate in a fellow cadet's funeral accomplishes two
 things: It helps cadets during an emotional time to say a final good-bye to their close friend, and comforts the family involved
 when they see and meet a contingent of cadets honoring their son or daughter. The cadets also serve as the representative
 of all other cadets and cadet families at the hometown services. The honor guard cadets are reimbursed for travel expenses.
- Cadet humanitarian travel the Rando Fund supports cadets if they must travel home to attend the funeral services for, or
 the critical illness of, a family member (defined as: parent, step-parent, sibling, grandparent, or legal guardian). Travel
 reimbursement is based on financial need, as determined and recommended by the cadet's AOC/AMT, or the Commandant's
 Office. Financial need is defined as the inability for the cadet and his/her family to provide for the cost of the cadet's travel
 expenses due to family financial hardship. As with the USAFA honor guard, cadets are not asked to repay the Rando Fund.

In 1996 C1C Dennis Rando perished in a USAFA training flight, along with his instructor pilot (one of three accidents caused by faulty design of a since-scrapped aircraft) and the cadet honor guard who went to his Boston funeral paid their own way. When the USAFA Parents' Association of Eastern Massachusetts learned of this, they chipped in to reimburse the cadets. This selfless gesture became the origins of the Fund, named in Cadet Rando's memory. Parents' Clubs around the country have joined in supporting this cause, as well as generous individuals. The Academy fully endorses the Rando Fund, as USAFA funding is unavailable for such purposes.

From 2000 through 2022, the late Jack Bernazzani P'03 led the Rando Fund. He oversaw the 2012 transition from a separate non-profit to engaging the Air Force Academy Foundation to handle all aspects of the Fund's administration. This enables the Fund to dedicate 100% of every donation to fund its missions in support of the cadets. The Rando Fund remains viable and can only continue to support these missions as a result of the generous donations that you and/or your parents' associations contribute.

In 2023-24 the Fund helped 29 cadets in the amount of \$23,248, far exceeding donations during that time. A letter received from the parents of a fallen cadet:

Subject: Value of the Rando Fund? - priceless - please read



Like many of you, shortly after we boarded the USAFA rollercoaster, we began to hear about the Rando Fund. It rang a bell only because at our first meeting with the Central FL Parent's Club, the Rando Fund was a line item on the budget. We didn't really know or understand what it was. When we did find out about it, our thoughts were basically, "it's nice they have that", and not much more. We bought our raffle tickets the first year and didn't give it another thought. We later heard how the Rando Fund had helped a local cadet get home to her family after their home was severely damaged in the Hurricanes of 2004...6 weeks, 3 hurricanes directly over their small town. Again, we thought "glad that was in place to help them". [That] year we bought our raffle tickets, and I actually won a quilt!

...we never in a million years thought there would ever be a reason for our family to benefit from the Rando Fund.

I can't say enough good things about the Rando Fund. With Lindsay's death over the Christmas holidays when travel is at its peak and airlines jack up the rates, we were surprised at the number of cadets who were able to come to Lindsay's service here in FL.

It was later that we learned the Rando Fund had helped. Even over the holidays, when a lot of USAFA was shut down, phone calls were made and the Chaplains helped out. I am not sure of the details of the "how", just that I know of at least two of her closest friends that were able to come because of the Rando Fund.

I can't begin to explain what it meant to have the people she was closest to the last few months of her life, there with us at the worst possible moments in ours. We cried, we laughed, we heard great stories....all courtesy of the Rando Fund.
